Farewell from Norm Harburn, Inaugural President, 1988-2008

Twenty years ago, the PFC began as a group of excited volunteers, of which I was one. As an agent of the city of Calgary, we successfully and in a short time frame, pulled together the political will and funding to build the James Short Park. Ten years later, the Foundation was taking on bigger projects, finalizing the funding for the Partnerparks Endowment and raising the nine million to build the world's largest skatepark, the "Shaw Millennium Park".

Today the Foundation has its headquarters in a fully furnished 1890's historic site, Haultain School, complete with its own park. Challenging and exciting projects loom on the horizon. The approximately \$20 million dollar Harvie Passage Project will be our largest and costliest project when it opens in three years time. In total, over 35 projects, worth \$120 million plus, have helped transform Calgary into an award winning centre in the area of parks, amateur sports and river valleys.

None of the Foundations successes would have been possible without the dedicated volunteers and citizens responsible for producing many of the park projects in Calgary. I want you to know how much I enjoyed working with each of you. You are all invited to visit me on Gabriola Island and pull a few weeds in my new private park!

I am pleased to be handing the reigns over to Myrna Dubé. I have known and trusted her for years to be a great leader. Myrna will make this foundation soar to new heights.

We are targeting summer 2009 for the completion and grand opening of Haultain Park.

Thanks to the generosity of governments, foundations, corporations and individuals, the majority of funds to complete this highly used inner city park, have been secured.

The total cost to complete the handicapped-accessible playground, mini-soccer field, pathways, seating areas and parkland is approximately \$1.5 million. To date more than \$1.1 million has been raised. Our target is to secure the remaining \$380,000 by March 31, 2008. ↕

Creating a "living classroom" for Calgary's Children

Located at Spruce Meadows, the project will include an outdoor classroom, a pond viewing platform, an interpretive marsh walk and a floating deep-water platform for viewing underwater life.
